Two Interesting QSL Cards

Bob, W1RH

Every year, the City of Placerville lines the south side of Highway with lit Christmas trees. It's a holiday tradition that goes way back. The trees are sponsored by individuals, clubs and businesses on a first come, first served basis. This year, the El Dorado County Amateur Radio Club decided to sponsor a tree, and a very special tree it is.

The club call sign, AG6AU, was a vanity call chosen to represent the Periodic Table elements silver (AG) and gold (AU).

The tree was decorated in silver and gold. The lights send the club call sign in Morse Code and it's very noticeable when driving on Highway 50. MLDXCC and EDCARC member Stefan, AF6SA, programmed an Arduino Computer to trigger the lights, effectively sending the call sign in CW.

We needed ornaments. What to decorate it with? I came up with the idea of using QSL cards from all over the world. MLDXCC and EDCARC member Jay, KE6GLA, came up with the original idea for the tree. His wife, Nancy – KG6PN, laminated 200 QSL cards and each card is attached to the tree with ty-wraps.

I needed to come up with some cards and found a batch from an ARRL DX contest dxpedition three of us did to Grenada in 1999. In going through the cards, I found two that caught my eye that I set aside, saving them from a second life on a Christmas tree along Highway 50.

Recognize the call sign on the first card?




Yep, it's Joe Taylor. The same "JT" who responsible for WSJT software and the JT4/9/65 digital modes. Also, the same "T" used in FT4 and FT8. The "F", by the way, represents the "F" in Franke, as in Steven Franke, K9AN, the codeveloper of the FT modes.

So, who'd of guessed that the guy who will forever be remembered for developing these great weak-signal digital modes also worked DX in a phone contest? You'll note that he worked us (J37VG – J37 Visit Grenada) on 10, 15, and 20 meters. Here's the back of his QSL:

The second card I saved from the exhaust fumes of Highway 50 was from Rick, AB1U, better known as MLDXCC member, W6RKC. The report was on the back of the card, along with the call and location he worked us with – W6RKC, Pine Grove, CA. I'm guessing Rick had recently moved from "1" land and didn't have his new cards yet.




As you can see, Rick was a member of the Yankee Clipper Contest Club, as was I.

Tube of the Month

KELLOGG 401A

When AM radios in the home became popular in the mid-1920s, vast numbers of the UX201A tubes were produced. In a previous article I noted that over 775 different makers or rebranders flooded the market with tubes. Most of these tubes had 5 volt DC filaments. Power for these radios was supplied by batteries. Car batteries were 6 volts so could power the filaments with a dropping resistor. The plate power required a "B" battery or a couple of them in series. Many of the cities had been wired with AC voltage distribution systems, but the REA (Rural Electrification Act) didn't start until 1936. Out in the country, the farmer's radio had to use B batteries and often needed to park the Model-T near the window where filament wires could be attached to the Flivver's battery. Families who had AC power could buy a B eliminator which was a case with a transformer, a capacitor and an 80 rectifier to produce the DC for the plates, but you still had to supply higher current for the DC filaments.

These early triodes had a simple filament and if you applied AC to the tube, it worked but the AC hum made it un-useable. The McCullough and Kellogg companies came up with a new type tube in 1926. They isolated the filament circuit from the grid and brought it out the top. This required a separate cap socket, but it did work.



Any success was short lived as there was the potential for some big money to be made and the big tube makers were designing tubes with new filament combinations and heated cathodes that would work with AC. The 401A and the 403A (the amplifier version) were only produced for a short time, but GE/RCA did experiment with the top filament cap until they added more pins to the base. The tubes proved to be more of a collector's item than a commercial success as they weren't suitable for mass production.
